This Budget continues to support the industries that have made our regions so successful for so many years, and invests to create more opportunities to take our local produce to the world like never before.

We are building new industrial capacity, with precincts in Parkes, Wagga Wagga, and the Hunter, tailor-made to ensure local industries will thrive long into the future.

And we will continue to make regional and rural NSW the renewable energy powerhouse of Australia, getting ahead of the curve to secure clean, cheap energy future for our state.

The coming months and years will be critical in securing a strong recovery for regional NSW. This Budget holds nothing back, as we move on from the year that was, and look with hope to the opportunities that lie ahead.

01. Supporting our Regions



OVERVIEW

The 2020-21 NSW Budget reflects the NSW Government's clear focus on supporting our regions through recovery, reform and a return to prosperity after a year of unprecedented challenges. There has never been a more important time to make sure that our regional communities impacted by drought, bushfires, floods and COVID-19 are getting the help they need to rebuild and recover.

The NSW Government is focused on supporting our regional businesses, including manufacturing, resource and agricultural sectors, to recover quickly and return to growth, while also positioning regional economies to further specialise in innovation and technology-focused industries. Our investment in regional NSW will:

- Support economic recovery for the communities and businesses of regional NSW.
- Provide vital assistance for communities following the drought and 2019-20 summer bushfires.
- Reinforce a targeted approach to drought resilience and water security.
- Improve road and rail connections between regions and cities to enable faster movement of goods and improve access for visitors.
- Assist businesses to expand, establish, invest and create more jobs in the regions.
- Protect and improve the environment and local character of NSW's regional communities.

Highlights of the NSW Government's new and existing key regional investments are included in this document.

DROUGHT RELIEF

From mid-2017 to 2020, NSW experienced one of the worst droughts on record which continues to cast a long shadow across our regions. As of October 2020. 12 per cent of the State still remains in drought, presenting significant challenges to the agriculture sector across the State. The NSW Government is standing by our farmers, their families and rural communities, and has committed approximately \$4.5 billion in drought assistance and water security support.

Drought assistance in NSW provides ongoing support to farmers, while helping to accelerate recovery for producers who have seen conditions improve. Existing NSW Government support includes:

• \$1 billion for the Farm Innovation Fund to provide concessional loans and provide greater drought resilience.

- \$1 billion for the Safe and Secure Water Program to provide safe, secure and sustainable water and wastewater services to regional NSW.
- \$170 million for the Drought Stimulus Package to fund shovel-ready infrastructure projects.
- Waiving of heavy vehicle charges for eligible primary producers.
- Deferral or extended installment plans for drought-affected customers who have difficulty meeting their payroll tax obligations.
- Waiving of Local Land Services rates and other Government charges.

The NSW Government has provided \$310 million in additional funding since the 2019-20 Half-Yearly Review. This includes:

- \$116 million to continue the Drought Transport Subsidy.
- **\$99 million** in assistance for eligible primary producers, including waiving Local Land Services rates, bee site permits, Western Lands lease rent, wild dog fence rates and meeting vehicle registration costs.
- \$28.5 million to continue existing water license fee waivers for stock, domestic, general and high security water users.
- Continuing health and wellbeing programs, including the Farmgate Counselors program, Aboriginal wellbeing services and Royal Flying Doctors Far West Drought Support programs.



REBUILDING COMMUNITIES AFFECTED BY BUSHFIRES

The NSW Government is providing vital assistance to rebuild communities. committing \$4.4 billion in bushfire recovery support. This includes the restoration and future-proofing of assets against natural disasters, while also providing important stimulus and resilience to communities impacted by the 2019-20 bushfires.

The NSW Government has created a \$1 billion Bushfire Infrastructure Package to clean-up and repair roads, bridges, schools and other state assets affected by the 2019-20 bushfires. The package will also be used to repair fencing destroyed by bushfire and upgrade critical communication networks used by emergency service workers. Further initiatives supported by the Bushfire Infrastructure Package include:

- \$217 million to continue the rollout of critical communications infrastructure.
- \$190 million for local infrastructure projects and additional agricultural research stations to stimulate local economies and improve the resilience of regional communities and industries.
- \$100 million to replace, repair and build resilience in NSW Government infrastructure impacted by the 2019-20 bushfires.
- \$46 million to the forestry industry for urgent infrastructure repairs, nursery expansions and replanting the forest.

Further support is being provided to local communities, including:

• \$540 million committed in partnership with the Commonwealth to drive economic recovery under the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund, including establishing a \$250 million grants program for regional areas.

- \$335 million to support more than 20,000 businesses affected by bushfires through small business recovery and support grants.
- \$209 million to re-establish boundary fences adjoining Crown Land destroyed in the bushfires.
- \$110 million to support 1,800 farmers through Primary Producer Recovery Grants.
- \$10 million to provide more than 200 recovery pods in temporary accommodation for families who have lost their homes. Over 8,000 people have also been provided with emergency accommodation since November 2019.



FOSTERING ECONOMIC GROWTH AND PROSPERITY

The NSW Government has allocated funding into health and economic stimulus measures designed to support the people, businesses and communities of regional NSW.

- A \$1.8 billion commitment for regional NSW from the \$3 billion Jobs and Infrastructure Acceleration Fund to accelerate economic recovery and create new jobs. This includes:
 - \$300 million to support the accelerated delivery of the \$500 million Fixing Country Bridges program, to better connect regional and rural communities.
 - \$198.8 million for businesses in regional NSW from the Small Business Support Fund ensuring businesses receive the support they need to keep operating.

- **\$72.1 million** in 2020-21 (as part of a \$673.3 million project) for the Tweed Hospital and Integrated Ambulatory Services Redevelopment.
- **\$10.1 million** in 2020-21 (as part of a \$698.6 million project) for the new Shellharbour Hospital (State and Federal funded).
- New primary schools at Googong and Murrumbateman.
- An additional \$300 million to recharge the Regional Growth Fund (bringing the total to \$2 billion) to support growing regional centres, activate local economies and improve services.
- \$50 million for Resources for Regions Round 7, supporting the ongoing prosperity of mining communities in regional NSW by providing economic opportunities, improved local amenities and positive social outcomes.

The NSW Government is investing **\$4.2 billion** through the Snowy Hydro Legacy Fund to build transformational infrastructure across regional NSW. Several projects are now underway, including:

- \$185.4 million for the Parkes Special Activation Precinct, delivering vital infrastructure including roads, water and wastewater connections to the precinct.
- \$100 million for the Gig State Project to deliver a metro-level internet service to regional communities and businesses.
- \$20.6 million to progress early works for the Wagga Wagga Special Activation Precinct.



BOOSTING JOBS AND SKILLS

The NSW Government is committed to creating jobs and arming the people of NSW with the right skills to meet the needs of our recovering economy:

- \$140 million from the Bushfire Industry Recovery Package to support retaining and creating jobs in the forestry, horticulture and agriculture industries.
- \$100 million for the Regional Job Creation Fund to support existing businesses in regional NSW to grow and encourage interstate or overseas businesses to invest in regional NSW.
- \$50.8 million in the State's primary industries research and development infrastructure portfolio under the World Class Food and Fibre (WCFF) program.
- \$9.8 million in 2020-21 to deliver Business Connect advisory services to support businesses to start, run, adapt or grow. Around 60 per cent of Business Connect advisory services are delivered to regional businesses.
- Further development of the NSW Industry Capability Network, which provides complementary capability matching services to local NSW suppliers in the supply chain of major government and private sector projects.
- Support for workers moving to regional NSW through Skills Relocation Assistance, providing grants of up to \$10,000 per eligible skilled worker to meet the cost of moving from metropolitan areas.

DELIVERING HIGH QUALITY AND ACCESSIBLE SERVICES

Investing in infrastructure and services to address the needs of communities living and working in regional NSW, including education, healthcare and support for young people living in regional locations.


- \$120 million for the Regional Schools Renewal Program.
- \$100 million to bring forward Stage 2 of the Rural Ambulance Infrastructure Reconfiguration.
- Continuation of the \$100 million Regional Cultural Fund to enhance cultural vitality and increase cultural and creative participation across our regions.
- \$60 million for the Regional Schools Roof Replacement Program.
- \$50 million for a Arts Rescue and Restart Package to support arts and cultural organisations, which includes \$8 million for 60 organisations across regional NSW.



- \$46.8 million over four years to recruit 100 additional wellbeing and in-reach nurses in vulnerable regions to provide wellbeing and health checks and referrals in schools.
- \$28.3 million (as part of \$59 million over two years) for the delivery of the NSW Government's Marine Estate Management Strategy.
- \$19.1 million (as part of \$43.5 million over two years) to bolster the delivery of the State's biosecurity activities in combating pests weeds and plant and animal disease in rural communities.

- \$10 million for the Office for Regional Youth.
- \$3.8 million for ongoing development of the State's Spatial Data Infrastructure.
- \$1.4 million for the Corsnet System to provide improved positioning and guidance information for users across the State.
- \$1 million in 2020-21 to support the Office of Drought Response.





TRANSFORMING COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE

Infrastructure projects to boost facilities in regional NSW while also providing rapid job creation through their construction and maintenance.

- \$255 million for shovel-ready regional maintenance projects, including \$108 million in 2019-20, as part of a \$500 million NSW Government investment.
- \$100 million over two years for the Greater Cities and Regional Sports Facility Fund to deliver sports infrastructure grants of up to \$1 million, with a focus on regional NSW.

- \$60 million over three years to upgrade Goulburn Police Academy, providing for a state of the art training facility that enables essential and efficient resourcing capability development through effective training, development and enhanced technology.
- **\$52.1 million** (as part of a \$107.9 million program) to continue redeveloping police stations across NSW including at Cessnock, Broken Hill, and Inverell, as well as land acquisition and planning for Port Macquarie Police Station.
- \$14.1 million (as part of a \$100 million program) to continue investment to build and upgrade police stations in Bega, Goulburn, Jindabyne area (including Jindabyne, Perisher and Thredbo), Bourke and Bathurst, and a new police education and training facility at Dubbo.

CONNECTING OUR REGIONS

Better connecting our regions and cities through a pipeline of investment and job creation opportunities.

- \$335 million in 2020-21 for the continued delivery of the New Intercity Fleet to deliver a new, state-of-the-art fleet that will provide a new level of comfort and convenience for customers who travel between Sydney, the Central Coast and Newcastle, the Blue Mountains, and the South Coast.
- \$43.3 million in 2020-21 for the continued delivery of the Regional Rail Fleet Program.
- \$31.4 million in 2020-21 for the continued planning of the Fast Rail Program (State and Federal funded).
- \$13.5 million in 2020-21 for the continued planning and delivery of the 16 Cities Program which is boosting bus services in key regional centres.

POWERING OUR STATE

Working closely with NSW communities and the renewable energy industry to increase renewable energy generation in the State at the least cost to the consumer.

- \$110.5 million for Renewable Energy Zones to unlock a significant pipeline of large-scale renewable energy and storage projects, which will support an estimated \$32 billion of private investment and 9,000 jobs in the regions by 2030.
- \$49.7 million over two years to fast-track and incentivise pre-investment studies provided for pumped hydro projects and improved competition under the Electricty Infrastructure Investment Safeguard.

CARING FOR THE VULNERABLE

Providing housing and essential support services to people experiencing homelessness in NSW including regional locations.

• \$600 million over three years for the construction and accleration of new social housing properties across a range of major regional and metro locations, as well as upgrades and maintenance to over 3,500 social housing properties.

EMPOWERING ABORIGINAL COMMUNITIES

Upgrading infrastructure and improving living standards in Aboriginal communities.

- \$212 million to deliver new and upgraded quality social and affordable housing for Aboriginal communities across a range of major regional and metro locations, and supporting employment in the local construction and trade industries.
- \$69.3 million to deliver the Roads to Home program, which will provide planning and infrastructure upgrades to up to seven further Aboriginal communities, in addition to the original ten communities.

BRINGING THE BEST OF NSW TO THE WORLD

Showcasing the strengths of the regional NSW economy and incentivising businesses from Australia and overseas to operate in our regions.

- \$6.5 million in 2020-21 (as part of \$59.5 million over four years) to expand NSW's international trade and investment network, promoting made-in-NSW products to countries across the world.
- \$1.5 million in 2020-21 (as part of \$6.4 million over four years) for the Going Global export program, providing tailored support for NSW businesses to enter new export markets.
- **\$0.2 million** in 2020-21 (as part of \$12.4 million over four years) to extend Study NSW, supporting international education, particularly through the regional universities network.
- **\$0.2 million** in 2020-21 (as part of \$6.5 million over four years) to boost the NSW Export team, connecting businesses in regional NSW with exporter support programs.

PROTECTING OUR WILDLIFE AND ENVIRONMENT

Highlighting NSW's natural beauty, building on local character, enhancing liveability and improving the quality of the local environment.

- \$37.5 million commitment over two years to deliver expanded wildlife hospital facilities at Taronga Western Plains Zoo Dubbo and Taronga Zoo Sydney.
- **\$6.6 million** in 2020-21 (as part of a \$8.8 million project) for a world-class Platypus Visitor and Education Facility at Taronga Western Plains Zoo.
- \$3.2 million in 2020-21 (as part of a \$3.7 million project) to upgrade the Murramarang South Coast Walk connecting the coastal villages of Maloneys Beach, Durras, Depot Beach, Kioloa and Bawley Point.
- \$2.1 million in 2020-21 (as part of a \$7.9 million project) to upgrade the Light to Light Great Walk connecting historic Boyds Tower and the Green Cape Light Station.

- \$111.1 million in 2020-21 (as part of a \$200 million project) for the Wyong Hospital Redevelopment.
- **\$8.3 million** in 2020-21 (as part of a \$39.6 million project) for the Central Coast Medical Schools and Central Coast Research Institute (third party funding contribution).

• \$15 million in 2020-21 (as part of a \$38 million project) to build the new Porters Creek Public School.

TRANSPORT

- \$39.2 million in 2020-21 to continue construction for widening the Pacific Highway to four lanes between Parsons Road and Ourimbah Street at Lisarow.
- \$5.2 million in 2020-21 on traffic efficiency improvements including intersection upgrades.
- \$4.3 million in 2020-21 to continue planning for the upgrade of the Pacific Highway through Wyong Town Centre.

• \$3.1 million in 2020-21 to continue planning for the future upgrade of Manns Road between Stockyard Place and Narara Creek Road.



- \$20.4 million in 2020-21 (as part of a \$35 million project) for the Western Cancer Centre in Dubbo (State and Federal funded).
